30th October: Back to busy with counts of 40 Wigeon, 7 Teal, Long-tailed Duck, Goosander, 2 Sparrowhawks, Kestrel, 8 Purple Sandpipers, 5 Jack Snipe, 130 Snipe, 200+ Woodcock, 2 Great Skuas, 24 Wood Pigeons, 10 Shorteared Owls, 11 Waxwings, 43 Robins, the Bluethroat, Black Redstart, 2 Whinchats, Ring Ouzel, 570 Blackbirds, 500 Fieldfare, 100 Song Thrushes, 630 Redwing, 2 Lesser Whitethroats, 25 Blackcaps, 11 Chiffchaffs, 22 Goldcrests, Jackdaw, 39 Brambling, 9 Greenfinches, 78 Bullfinches, 80 Snow Buntings, 3 Yellowhammers and 6 Reed Buntings! The Little Grebe is still at South Light!

29th October: Slightly busier with 40 Wigeon, 54 Teal, 2 Long-tailed Ducks, 5 Goldeneye, Sparrowhawk, 2 Moorhens, 21 Lapwings, 3 Curlew, 10 Wood Pigeons, Long-eared Owl, 2 Short-eared Owls, 16 Waxwings, 34 Robins, 2 Black Redstarts, 440 Blackbirds, 350 Fieldfare, 60 Song Thrushes, 500 Redwing, Lesser Whitethroat, 30 Blackcaps, 9 Chiffchaffs, 13 Goldcrests, Jackdaw, 7 Brambling, 3 Greenfinches, 107 Bullfinches and 4 Reed Buntings.

<u>28th October:</u> Today's highlight was a dead Little Auk! Counts included 2 Sparrowhawks, the Moorhen, 131 Turnstone, a Great Skua, 4 Wood Pigeons, a Long-eared Owl, 36 Waxwings, 36 Robins, 540 Blackbirds, 440 Fieldfare, 65 Song Thrushes, 530 Redwing, 29 Blackcaps, 7 Chiffchaffs, 30 Goldcrests, Jackdaw, 53 Brambling and 110 Bullfinches. The Little Grebe is still at South Light.

<u>27th October:</u> Scarce migrants included the ringed **Great Grey Shrike**, the **Short-toed Lark**, what is presumably the same **Pallas's Warbler** and a **Little Grebe**. Numbers remain the same as yesterday with 4 **Cormorants**, the **Moorhen**, 62 **Redshank**, **Wood Pigeon**, 45 **Waxwings**, 27 **Robins**, the **Bluethroat**, **Black Redstart**, 2 **Whinchats**, **Ring Ouzel**, 220 **Blackbirds**, 320 **Fieldfare**, 110 **Song Thrushes**, 450 **Redwing**, 7 **Blackcaps**, 11 **Chiffchaffs**, 4 **Goldcrests**, the **Jackdaw** and 140 **Bullfinches**.

26th October: Two Great Grey Shrikes (trapped in double dyke and Springfield) and a Little Bunting were found this afternoon. The morning's counts included 5 Whooper Swans, 4 Greenland White-fronted Geese, the Slavonian Grebe, ring-tail Hen Harrier, 5 Merlins, 3 Water Rails, 5 Curlew, first-winter Glaucous Gull, 2 Wood Pigeons, 3 Waxwings, 37 Robins, 300 Blackbirds, 270 Fieldfare, 160 Song Thrushes, 550 Redwing, the Lesser Whitethroat, a Garden Warbler, 12 Blackcaps, 6 Siskin, 110 Bullfinches and 7 Lapland Buntings.

<u>25th October:</u> The Short-toed Lark and Pallas's Warbler remain. Census produced the Slavonian Grebe, 11 Woodcock, Curlew, 2 Glaucous Gulls (adult and 1w), Wood Pigeon, Long-eared Owl, 60 Waxwings, 25 Robins, Black Redstart, 2 Ring Ouzels, 450 Blackbirds, 700 Fieldfare, 100 Song Thrushes, 800 Redwing, 25 Blackcaps, a few Chiffchaffs, 75 Brambling and 115+ Bullfinches.

24th October: No sign of the Rufous-tailed Robin, but skies were clear last night. New birds included a Pallas's Warbler in Gilly Burn and a Short-toed Lark at Busta, but rarer for Fair Isle, was a Little Grebe in South Harbour!! Late in the day, 150 Waxwings passed along the west cliffs in small parties. Census was otherwise quiet with 2 Short-eared Owls, 180 Blackbirds, 300 Fieldfare, 140 Song Thrushes, 600 Redwing, 16 Blackcaps, Jackdaw, 5 Chaffinches, 55 Brambling, 3 Greenfinches, 94 Bullfinches, 3 Lapland Buntings, 3 Yellowhammers and 80 Snow Buntings.

23rd October: Another mega: A RUFOUS-TAILED ROBIN was found in Bulls Park this morning although its identity was only confirmed mid afternoon. Other counts in a minimal census included 4 Whooper Swans, 3 Short-eared Owls, 13 Waxwings, 20 Robins, Black Redstart, 700 Redwing, 500 each of Blackbird and Fieldfare,

<u>22nd October:</u> Today's highlights were a **Slavonian Grebe** in North Haven and a **Richard's Pipit** in the Wirvie! Other counts included 7 **Short-eared Owls**, 6 **Waxwings**, 39 **Robins**, a new **Bluethroat**, 2 **Black Redstarts**, 15 **Ring Ouzels**, 1500 **Blackbirds**, 1300 **Fieldfares**, 340 **Song Thrushes**, 1700 **Redwing**, **Mistle Thrush**, 2 **Lesser Whitethroats**, 24 **Blackcaps**, 2 **Jackdaws**, 72 **Brambling**, 56 **Bullfinches** and the possible **Arctic Redpoll**.

21st October: No sign of the Chestnut-eared Bunting today although conditions were terrible with very heavy rain and low cloud forcing an abandonment of census mid-morning! However, a flyover Shorelark at Busta was a nice find! Fewer birds around, mainly grounded from yesterday's fall with a Moorhen, 27 Common Gulls, Long-eared Owl, 2 Short-eared Owls, the Richard's Pipit, 4 Waxwings, a new Stonechat, 2 Ring Ouzels, 700 Blackbirds, 700 Fieldfare, 60 Song Thrushes, 800 Redwing, 10 Blackcaps, 4 Goldcrests, 8 Chiffchaffs, 120 Brambling, 3 Greenfinches, 2 Siskin, 45 Bullfinches and 3 Yellowhammers.

20th October: An excellent day today with an Olive-backed Pipit at Naaversgill and a possible Arctic Redpoll at the school. However, the day will long live in the memory for the numbers of thrushes with estimated counts of 3 Ring Ouzels, 1200 Blackbirds, 15,000 Fieldfare, 200 Song Thrushes and 7,000 Redwing! Other counts included 9 Long-tailed Ducks, Common Scoter, 4 Water Rails, 40 Woodcock, Wood Pigeon, Long-eared Owl, 90 Waxwings, 6 Dunnocks, 7 Robins, Redstart, a Garden Warbler, 28 Blackcaps, 28 Goldcrests, 9 Chiffchaffs, Rook, 4 Chaffinches, 442 Brambling, 8 Greenfinches, 5 Siskin, 80 Bullfinches, 3 Mealy Redpolls, 5 Yellowhammers and 5 Reed Buntings. The Chestnut-eared Bunting is still showing well.

19th October: A slightly better day today, with a few more thrushes around, numbering 100 Blackbirds, 160 Fieldfare, 32 Song Thrushes, 720 Redwing and a Ring Ouzel. Other counts included 2 Woodcock, Long-eared Owl, 25 Waxwings, Ring Ouzel, 8 Blackcaps, 35 Goldcrests, 19 Brambling and 58 Northern Bullfinches. The Chestnut-eared Bunting and Dusky Warbler are still present.

18th October: A Dusky Warbler was found in Field Ditch mid-morning and although initially giving good views, it soon proved elusive! The Chestnut-eared Bunting is also still showing in the Skadan Crop. Otherwise, fairly quiet with typical autumn migrants including a Long-tailed Duck, 3 Peregrines, 2 Collared Doves, 2 Long-eared Owls, the Richard's Pipit, the Bluethroat, 30 Waxwings, a similar number of thrushes (80 Blackbirds, 60 Fieldfare, 35 Song Thrush, 210 Redwing), Mealy Redpoll, 100 Northern Bullfinches and 10 Lapland Buntings.

17th October: Much quieter today, although the Chestnut-eared Bunting is still showing well to the gathering crowds. Counts included 5 Long-tailed Ducks, Common Scoter, the Bluethroat, 22 Waxwings, half of yesterday's total of thrushes, 37 Bramblings, 7 Siskin, 77 Northern Bullfinches and 10 Lapland Buntings.

16th October: Mid-October strikes again. The presumed Little Bunting was trapped during the afternoon and appears to be a **Chestnut-eared Bunting!** - an east Asian species and the first for Europe!! This bird was aged as a first-winter due to the dark grey-brown iris, unmoulted alula feather and pointed tail (although adults of this species also have pointed tails, they are usually broader and more glossy) and sexed as a male on measurements. It shows absolutely NO signs of captivity with immaculate bare parts and no obvious nicks out of the feathers. Other counts include 11 Long-tailed Ducks, 2 Bluethroats, good numbers of thrushes, 60 Goldcrests and an impressive 115 Northern Bullfinches.

15th October: A good fall of thrushes, Blackcaps and Goldcrests on the west cliffs during the morning with 40 Waxwings and at least 55 Northern Bullfinches for company! The Brent Goose and Corncrake remain as does one Richard's Pipit and the Little Gull. Two Arctic Terns and a Reed Warbler were new. A presumed Little Bunting is in the Skadan crop.

14th October: Numbers of thrushes etc remain the same, but a Little Gull in Dutfield was a good rarity. A Little Bunting in the Meadow Burn was also new. Otherwise, the Brent Goose, 2 Richard's Pipits, 2 Bluethroats and 2 Yellow-browed Warblers are also note-worthy.

13th October: Much the same as yesterday regarding numbers of migrants, with the Brent Goose, Goldeneye, a Corncrake, 2 Richard's Pipits and 2 Bluethroats the highlights.

12th October: A good day, with new arrivals including a Short-toed Lark at Naaversgill, a Little Bunting in Hjukni Geo, a Great Northern Diver in Furse and a Yellowhammer. The Great Grey Shrike was unfortunately found dead at Skerryholm. Counts included 2 Sparrowhawks, 11 Jack Snipe, 11 Woodcock, single Long and Short-eared Owls, 2 Black Redstarts, 4 Whinchats, 86 Blackbirds, 120 Fieldfare, 30 Song Thrushes, 280 Redwing, 2 Mistle Thrushes, the Sedge Warbler, 3 Lesser Whitethroats, 45 Blackcaps, a Yellow-browed Warbler, 10 Chiffchaffs, Willow Warbler, 40 Goldcrests, 19 Brambling and 6 Bullfinches.

11th October: More migrants today, especially thrushes with counts of 190 Blackbirds, 190 Fieldfare, 53 Song Thrushes, 400 Redwing and a Mistle Thrush. Scarce migrants included the year's first Great Grey Shrike at Guidicum, a Brent Goose, 3 Yellow-browed Warblers, the Turtle Dove, the two Bluethroats and 5 'Northern' Bullfinches. Other census counts included 13 Jack Snipe, 77 Snipe, 6 Woodcock, Long-eared Owl, House Martin, 5 Tree Pipits, 4 Dunnocks, 7 Robins, 3 Whinchats, 4 Ring Ouzels, 4 Lesser Whitethroats, Whitethroat, 3 Garden Warblers, 50 Blackcaps, 24 Chiffchaffs (inc. 19 'abietinus/tristis' types), 62 Goldcrests, Pied Flycatcher and 115 Brambling.

10th October: A light south-easterly wind produced a good crop of late migrants with a Marsh Warbler, 2 Yellow-browed Warblers and a Turtle Dove the highlights. Other counts included 3 Water Rails, 13 Jack Snipe, 3 Woodcock, Long-eared Owl, 3 House Martins, 4 Tree Pipits, 4 Grey Wagtails, 5 Robins, the two Bluethroats, Black Redstart, 2 Redstarts, 3 Whinchats, 25 Blackbirds, 19 Fieldfare, 23 Song Thrushes, 82 Redwings, 3 Lesser Whitethroats, 6 Blackcaps, 9 Brambling and 122 Snow Buntings. Highlights on the sea were a Little Auk and Puffin.

9th October: Flat calm conditions on the sea made ideal sea-watching weather and a Grey Phalarope flew past Buness in the morning (over a Basking Shark!). Over and on land, 3 Whooper Swans, 4 Woodcock, Tree Pipit, 4 Robins, the 2 Bluethroats, 11 Blackbirds, 10 Fieldfare, 18 Song Thrushes, 38 Redwings, 2 Blackcaps and 21 Goldcrests were counted.

8th October: The Waxwing and Red-backed Shrike remain. New birds included a ring-tail Hen Harrier, a first-winter Glaucous Gull, 2 Sedge Warblers, a Lesser Whitethroat, a Garden Warbler and a Willow Warbler. Over-flying migrants included 7 Whooper Swans, 80 Barnacle Geese and a Great Northern Diver. Counts included 2 Wood Pigeons, 7 Robins, 2 Bluethroats, 2 Dunnocks, 14 Blackbirds, 13 Fieldfare, 30 Song Thrushes, 61 Redwing, Grasshopper Warbler, 25 Goldcrests, a Lesser Redpoll, 2 Mealy Redpolls, 4 'rostrata/islandica' Redpolls and 13 Lapland Buntings.

7th October: Today's highlights were a Waxwing at the Shop and a juvenile Red-backed Shrike on the Skadan crop. Visible migration over land and sea included 9 Whooper Swans, 4 White-fronted Geese, 2 Common Scoter, 3 Red-throated Divers and a Great Northern Diver. Census counts included 3 Peregrines, a Tree Pipit, 2 Bluethroats, 2 Stonechats, Ring Ouzel, 51 Song Thrushes, 2 Grasshopper Warblers, 9 Blackcaps and 25 Goldcrests.

6th October: A day for wildfowl with 3 White-fronted Geese being the highlight. Forty-five Pink-footed Geese, 80 Greylags, 51 Barnacles, 66 Wigeon and 6 Red-breasted Mergansers were also seen. Twenty-two Jack Snipe, 7 Shorteared Owls, the 2 Bluethroats, a late Grasshopper Warbler, 10 Blackcaps, 20 Goldcrests, a Crossbill, 4 Common Rosefinches, 10 Lapland Buntings and 125 Snow Buntings were also found.

5th October: A Booted Warbler was trapped on the early morning trap round. The Corncrake was seen again and there are now two Bluethroats. Sanderling, 17 Jack Snipe, 3 Short-eared Owls, 3 Redstarts, another Reed Warbler, 24 Bramblings, 8 Linnets, 3 Common Rosefinches, 5 Lapland Buntings, the Ortolan and 4 Reed Buntings were also seen.

4th October: Despite westerly winds, a Lanceolated Warbler was found and trapped in the Gully! A Spotted Crake was in Meadow Burn. Much the same otherwise with 3 Long-tailed Ducks, 2 Red-breasted Mergansers, 3 Merlins, 2 Water Rails, 3 Wood Pigeons, a Reed Warbler and 14 Lapland Buntings.

3rd October: A Grey Plover was a nice addition to the year list. A Pintail, juv Arctic Tern and Crossbill were also new. Otherwise, the 2 Long-tailed Ducks, 3 Sparrowhawks, Knot, Ruff, 3 Short-eared Owls, the Richard's Pipit, Tree Pipit, 2 Bluethroats, 6 Redstarts and 2 Yellow-browed Warblers were notable.

2nd October: Most birds seen today were from yesterday, with the Richard's Pipit, 2 Bluethroats and 2 Yellow-browed Warblers found. Otherwise, 2 Long-tailed Ducks, a Quail, 2 Woodcock, 20 Jack Snipe, 3 Short-eared Owls, 2 Grasshopper Warblers and a Lesser Redpoll were seen.

2004 - SEPTEMBER SIGHTINGS

<u>29th September, late evening update:</u> An adult <u>Red-flanked Bluetail</u> is in Gunnawark! At least three <u>Yellowbrowed Warblers</u>, three <u>Common Rosefinch</u> and a <u>Little Bunting</u> have also been seen. The <u>Corncrake</u> and <u>Dotterel</u> remain. A scattering of common migrants included a handful of <u>Willow Warblers</u> and <u>Chiffchaffs</u> and a couple of <u>Redstarts</u> and <u>Pied Flycatchers</u>. <u>Lapland Buntings</u> reached 16!

28th September: A day of light winds and a Fair Isle rarity in the form of a **Black-throated Diver** that flew over the Obs early morning. A **Dotterel** was on Ward Hill and a ringed **Common Rosefinch** was in Klingers Geo. Otherwise, the **Slavonian Grebe**, 15 **Cormorants, Common Sandpiper**, 4 **Whinchats**, 2 **Redwing**, 7 **Goldcrests**, 7 **Common Redpolls** and 12 **Lapland Buntings** were seen.

25th – 27th September: Much the same, weather and bird wise! Geese and ducks are still trickling through in small numbers, with highlights being 8 Red-breasted Mergansers on 26th. A Slavonian Grebe was in North Haven (26th – 27th) and the Corncrake is still in Gilsetter. Skylarks peaked at 330 birds (27th) and single Robins were seen on 25th and 27th, with Stonechat, 2 Blackbirds and 5 Redwing on the latter date. Another Common Rosefinch was trapped on 26th and the following day 10 Lapland Buntings were seen along with 145 Snow Buntings.

24th September: A slightly busier day with autumn/winter migrants including 140 Pink-footed Geese, 3 Tufted Ducks, Water Rail, Jack Snipe, Mealy Redpoll, 4 Lapland Buntings and 110 Snow Buntings. Two Common Rosefinches and 3 Blackcaps were also new.

<u>23rd September:</u> Another quiet day. A **Whooper Swan** and **Whimbrel** flew over the Obs, the **Corncrake** was retrapped in the Gully, the **Short-eared Owl** was at Pund and 85 **Snow Buntings** were in the north.

<u>21st – 22nd September:</u> Much the same. A trickle of **geese** and **ducks** passed through, a **Sooty Shearwater** was off South Light (22nd) and 6 **Cormorants** were in South Harbour (21st). The **Dotterel** was last seen on 21st and a **Sanderling** was new on 22nd. The **Short-eared Owl** re-appeared at Pund. A **Sedge** and **Willow Warbler** were both new on 21st as was a **Pied Flycatcher**. Nine **Lapland Buntings** and 220 **Snow Buntings** were found on 21st with 6 **Lapland** and 180 **Snow** the following day.

<u>20th September:</u> New arrivals included 200 Pink-footed Geese, Tufted Duck, Sparrowhawk and a Whimbrel. Other counts included 23 Dunlin, 63 Wheatears, Fieldfare, Whitethroat, 2 Blackcaps, a Redpoll, 8 Lapland Buntings and 130 Snow Buntings. A Common Rosefinch, the Corncrake and Dotterel all remain.



19th September: The Dotterel, Curlew Sandpiper, Corncrake, Little Stint, 2 Common Rosefinches and the long-staying Reed Bunting all remain. Otherwise 17 Wigeon, a Sooty Shearwater, 9 Lapland Buntings and 89 Snow Buntings were seen.

18th September: More of the same weather! A Curlew Sandpiper at the Puffinn and a Glaucous Gull were the two highlights. The **Dotterel** and 2 **Common Rosefinches** are still present. Counts included the **Barnacle Goose** (trapped in the evening), 38 Wigeon, Water Rail, Little Stint, 14 Purple Sandpipers, Ruff, 2 Jack Snipe, 65 Redshank, Common Sandpiper, 110 Turnstone, 160 Skylark, 5 Lapland Buntings and 75 Snow Buntings. A morning seawatch produced a Red-throated Diver, a Diver sp, 2 'blue' Fulmars, 2 Manx Shearwaters, 36 Guillemots and 2 Razorbills.

17th September: Windy again! A Corncrake was seen and then trapped in Field Ditch. The Dotterel re-appeared on Ward Hill and a Common Rosefinch and Barred Warbler were seen. Counts included 10 Pink-footed Geese, Barnacle Goose, Water Rail, 9 Goldcrests, 5 Lapland Buntings and 49 Snow Buntings. Sea-watches from land and from the Good Shepherd produced Red-throated and Great Northern Diver, a Diver sp. 7 Sooty Shearwaters, Manx Shearwater, 20 Storm Petrels, Pomarine Skua and 4 Puffins.

16th September: Another day of strong SW winds! Geese were on the move, with 46 Pink-footed, 11 Greylag and a Barnacle seen. Highlights included a Wryneck, Little Stint and a Common Rosefinch. Counts included 3 Knot, Ruff, Jack Snipe, the Short-eared Owl, 2 Lesser Whitethroats, 3 Garden Warblers, 7 Goldcrests, 2 Pied Flycatchers, 2 Lapland Buntings and 26 Snow Buntings.

15th September: A cold northwesterly wind made conditions difficult but a Slavonian Grebe in South Harbour and a Dotterel on the Swey were the main highlights with the **Barred** warbler Barkland and 2 Common Rosefinches. A Greylag Goose was a sign that the season is nearing its end and 45 Snow Buntings added to this.

12th September: A very windy day with near gale-force westerly winds and driving rain making bird-watching almost impossible! However, what we did manage to count included 2 Tufted Ducks, Kestrel, 2 Merlins, Peregrine, 2 Water Rails, 62 Golden Plovers, 3 Knot, Greenshank, 78 Turnstone, Tree Pipit, Barred Warbler, Whitethroat, 2 each of Garden Warbler and Blackcap, 3 Lapland Buntings and the autumn's first 2 Snow Buntings on Buness.

11th September: A touch of SE wind brought the inevitable fog for the morning, which had cleared by lunch-time. Some rarity action was provided with 2 Curlew Sandpipers in Kirki Geo – a welcome year-tick! Otherwise the sea produced 3 Sooty Shearwaters and a Manx Shearwater and 15 Storm Petrels from the Good Shepherd. Census counts included 2 Sparrowhawks, 2 Merlins, 60 Golden Plover, Tree Pipit, 450 Meadow Pipits, 2 Song Thrushes, Barred Warbler, 2 each of Garden Warbler and Blackcap, 3 Pied Flycatchers and 2 Lapland Buntings.

10th September: Much the same with 2 Barred Warblers and 3 Common Rosefinches the highlight. A Redbreasted Merganser, Water Rail, Sparrowhawk and Redstart were all new. Otherwise, counts included 29 Golden Plovers, Common Sandpiper, 3 Whitethroats, 2 Garden Warblers, 8 Willow Warblers, 3 Goldcrests, the 4 Lapland Buntings and the two Canada Geese.

9th September: The 3 Barred Warblers and 2 Common Rosefinches remain. New birds included a Song Thrush and Reed Bunting. Otherwise, census counts included 15 Wigeon, 4 Merlins, the Short-eared Owl (from the 6th), single Lesser Whitethroat, Whitethroat and Garden Warbler, 8 Willow Warblers, 4 Lapland Buntings and of course, the 2 Canada Geese.

8th September: Another quiet day. The sea produced a Great Northern Diver and 2 Red-throated Divers, while the land produced 5 Merlins, the ringed Icterine Warbler, 2 Barred Warblers, a new Whitethroat, 5 Willow Warblers, 3 Pied Flycatchers, 4 Common Rosefinches, 2 Lapland Buntings and the two Canada Geese.

7th September: The embarrassment of no rarities continues! However, scarce migrants included 3
Barred Warblers, 6 Common Rosefinches and an Icterine Warbler (sporting a ring on its left leg!). Common migrants included 4 Merlins, Peregrine, Sanderling, 320 Meadow Pipits, 4 Lesser Whitethroats, the Whitethroat, 4 Garden Warblers, Blackcap, 15 Willow Warblers, 8
Goldcrests, Pied Flycatcher, a Lapland Bunting and the now resident Canada Geese

6th September: Another sunny day, but the rarity drought continues. An increase of Common Rosefinches to 8 birds and the 3 Barred Warblers were the highlights. Otherwise, a Red-throated Diver, 2 Merlins, 4 Knot, Short-eared Owl, 2 Lesser Whitethroats, 7 Garden Warblers, 9 Willow Warblers and 6 Lapland Buntings were found.

A **Dragonfly spp**. was flushed from Da Water but could not be re-found – it is the third Fair Isle record of a dragonfly, all of which have been un-identified!

5th September: Back to westerly winds (although light) and a cracking sunny, summer's day! Very few birds though, with 3 Barred Warblers, 4 Common Rosefinches and 8 Lapland Buntings the main attractions. Other counts included 15 Teal, Pintail, Merlin (trapped), Peregrine, 54 Golden Plover, 18 Dunlin, 2 Tree Pipits, 4 Lesser Whitethroats, 9 Garden Warblers, 16 Willow Warblers and the 2 Canada Geese.

4th September: Today's highlights were 3 Barred Warblers
(Plantation, Chalet, Leogh) and 3
Common Rosefinches together at Quoy. Otherwise, census counts included a Little Stint, Swift, 3
Whinchats, Sedge Warbler,
Whitethroat, 7 Garden Warblers and the two Canada Geese.

<u>3rd September:</u> Another quiet day in a strengthening southerly wind – although a **Red-backed Shrike** was trapped in the Vaadal mid-morning. An influx of ducks included a **Pintail**, 14 **Teal** and 3 **Wigeon**. Waders included 4 **Knot**, the **Little Stint** (trapped in the evening), 8 **Dunlin** and a **Ruff**. Both **Green** and **Common Sandpiper** were in the Gully. Other sightings included the 2 **Tree Sparrows**, 2 **Common Rosefinch**, 4 **Tree Pipits**, 4 **Fieldfare**, a **Sedge Warbler** and the **Barred Warbler**. The long-staying **Canada Geese** are still in Walli Burn.

2nd September: A quieter day with just a thin scattering of common warblers, including two Goldcrests. Highlights were provided by a Wryneck at South Light, Barred Warbler at Haa, two Common Rosefinches in the Skadan crop and a Lapland Bunting over the Obs. Other sightings included four Grey Heron, Merlin, Peregrine, four Whinchat and a Pied Flycatcher.

1st September: A new month kicked off with a Barred Warbler trapped at the Obs, with another at Lower Stoneybrek, a Common Rosefinch in the Skadan crop and the first Lapland Bunting of the autumn. Other sightings included Little Stint, Ruff and Short-eared Owl plus 380 Meadow Pipits and one Tree Pipit, a Redstart, ten Garden Warblers, seven Willow Warblers and two Goldcrests.



31st August: A probable Great Snipe seen briefly in Homisdale livened things up for a while, but otherwise much the same with 5 Teal, Peregrine, Little Stint, Common Sandpiper, Long-eared Owl, 9 Garden Warblers, 3 Willow Warblers, Goldcrest and Reed Bunting the highlights.

30th August: More arrivals included 2 Tree Sparrows, 3 Teal, 2 Little Stints, 7 Whinchats, Grasshopper Warbler, Sedge Warbler, Barred Warbler and 4 Whitethroats. Other counts included 9 Garden Warblers, 14 Willow Warblers, 6 Goldcrests, the Cuckoo and the Long-eared Owl. The 2 Canada Geese are still in the Walli Burn.

29th August: Much the same, but a Tree Sparrow in the havens was very unusual for this time of year. Other new arrivals included 2 Wood Warblers, 3 Whinchats, a Lesser Black-backed Gull, 5 Goldcrests, 16 Garden Warblers, 20 Willow Warblers and 2 Pied Flycatchers. A Little Stint remains and the Wryneck and Cuckoo re-appeared.

28th August: Much the same with strong north-westerly winds. Another sea-watch included 2 Sooty Shearwaters and a Manx Shearwater. Otherwise, a Blackcap was a first for the autumn and a Wood Warbler was new. Counts included 2 Wigeon, Teal, Kestrel, 2 Peregrines, 2 Little Stints, 13 Dunlin, 2 Ruff, 6 Tree Pipits, Grasshopper Warbler, 5 Whitethroats, 14 Garden Warblers and 11 Willow Warblers.

<u>27th August:</u> Wind picking up from the north-west hampered most census counts, but a brief sea-watch produced a **Sooty Shearwater** from South Light. Counts we did manage included 10 **Wigeon**, 14 **Teal**, 5 **Little Stints**, 22 **Dunlin**, 130 **Redshank**, 3 **Greenshank**, Wryneck, Tree Pipit, Whitethroat, 6 **Garden Warblers** and 19 **Willow Warblers**.

26th August: A change in wind direction did nothing to help find migrants, but new birds included a Kestrel, 2 Peregrines, a Swift, Long-eared Owl, a new Black Redstart and a Redwing. Counts included 7 Knot, 5 Sanderling, 3 Little Stints, 19 Dunlin, 4 Ruff, 125 Redshank, 2 Greenshank, Green and Common Sandpiper, a Wryneck, 6 Reed Warblers, Barred Warbler, 18 Garden Warblers, 20 Willow Warblers, 6 Pied Flycatchers and the two Canada Geese.

25th August: Quieter today, but Wrynecks increased to 6 birds, a Juv Red-backed Shrike was at Schoolton, a Little Stint remains, as do the two Barred Warblers. Counts included 10 Grey Herons, Knot, 2 Sanderling, 5 Ruff, 5 Tree Pipits, 650 Meadow Pipits, 3 Fieldfare, 6 Whitethroats, 40 Garden Warblers, 29 Willow Warblers and 7 Pied Flycatchers.

24th August: A good fall of migrants today which included the year's first Little Stints (3). Other scarce migrants included 5 Wrynecks, 2 Barred Warblers, 2 Wood Warblers and a Common Rosefinch. Counts of migrants included 23 Lapwing, 5 Knot, 5 Purple Sandpipers, 5 Ruff, 11 Whimbrel, 3 Greenshank, Short-eared Owl, Tree Pipit, 1000 Meadow Pipits, 2 Redstarts, 6 Whinchats, Grasshopper Warbler, 36 Garden Warblers, 6 Chiffchaffs, 66 Willow Warblers and 16 Pied Flycatchers.

23rd August: A day of visible migration with a Turtle Dove passing through, 17 Swallows over-head and an impressive 1300 Meadow Pipits on the hill! Otherwise, 19 Storm Petrels were trapped over-night and census during the morning produced 61 Ringed Plovers, 5 Knot, Ruff, Redstart, 10 Garden Warblers, Wood Warbler, 20 Willow Warblers and 2 Common Rosefinches. A Green Sandpiper was trapped in the Vaadal.

22nd August: Much the same with counts of 8 Golden Plovers, 11 Knot, 3 Sanderling, 2 Ruff, 76 Redshank, a Wood Sandpiper, Tree Pipit, Black Redstart, 7 Fieldfare, Barred Warbler and yesterday's Common Rosefinch.

21st August: Migrants today included 3 Wigeon, 9 Teal, 3 Grey Herons, 45 Ringed Plovers, 11 Knot, 2 Sanderling, 13 Dunlin, 62 Redshank, 2 Green Sandpipers, Common Sandpiper, the Cuckoo, 3 Whinchats, 5 Reed Warblers, Icterine Warbler, 5 Garden Warblers, 8 Willow Warblers, a Spotted Flycatcher and a new Common Rosefinch.

<u>20th August:</u> A small arrival of migrants today included a **Short-eared Owl**, two **Barred Warblers**, a male **Red-backed Shrike** and the male **Reed Bunting**. Census produced 5 **Wigeon**, 4 **Grey Herons**, 8 **Purple Sandpipers**, 75 **Redshank**, 3 **Greenshank**, 60 **Turnstone**, **Cuckoo**, 220 **Meadow Pipits**, 6 **Whinchat**, 8 **Garden Warblers** and 13 **Willow Warblers**.

19th August: Much the same as yesterday. The Wood Sandpiper of the 14th was re-trapped in the Vaadal and a Tree Pipit was a first of the autumn. Scarce migrants included the Icterine Warbler, Barred Warbler and a juvenile Red-backed Shrike. Kestrel, 3 Knot, Dunlin, Cuckoo, 200 Meadow Pipits and 3 Ravens made up the bulk of the other sightings.

18th August: A quieter day for numbers of migrants, but an Icterine Warbler, Barred Warbler and 2 Red-backed Shrikes provided interest. Otherwise a Kestrel, 19 Golden Plovers, 3 Knot, 18 Dunlin, 4 Ruff, Greenshank, Cuckoo, Lesser Whitethroat and Wood Warbler were seen.

17th August: More migrants today that included a Wryneck, two Barred Warblers, 2 Red-backed Shrikes, 10 Ruff and 3 Wood Sandpipers. Other counts included Kestrel, 49 Redshank, Greenshank, 42 Turnstone, Cuckoo, 325 Meadow Pipits, 11 'alba' Wagtails, 3 White Wagtails, 5 Pied Wagtails, 2 Whinchats, 9 Fieldfare, 7 Reed Warblers, 4 Whitethroats, 15 Garden Warblers, Wood Warbler, 16 Willow Warblers, 7 Pied Flycatchers and the two Canada Geese.

16th August: Another extremely busy day for migrants that started with the discovery of another Aquatic Warbler – this one in the Walli Burn. A Spotted Crake was running around Gilsetter (first of the year) and Barred Warbler, Red-backed Shrike and Common Rosefinch were also new arrivals. The first 6 White Wagtails of the autumn were seen (with a further 8 'albas' and 6 Pied) but more notable (given the poor seabird season) was that of a fledged Common Tern. Census counts included 38 Lapwing, 31 Golden Plover, 27 Ringed Plovers, 3 Knot, 19 Dunlin, 24 Snipe, 48 Redshank, 2 Greenshank, 2 Green Sandpipers, Cuckoo, 35 Swallows, Sand Martin, 300 Meadow Pipits, 3 Redstarts, 2 Whinchats, 12 Reed Warblers, Lesser Whitethroat, 2 Whitethroats, 13 Garden Warblers, 6 Pied Flycatchers and the two Canada Geese.

15th August: A quieter day today. Migrant counts included a Knot, 16 Dunlin, Cuckoo, 8 Fieldfare, 10 Reed Warblers, 17 Garden Warblers, 8 Willow Warblers, 5 Pied Flycatchers and 88 Twite. The two Canada Geese remain.

14th August: Another wave of autumn migrants. A Wryneck, Icterine Warbler, Barred Warbler and 4 Red-backed Shrikes were all new and a Wood Sandpiper was trapped in the Vaadal. Counts included 13 Greylag Geese, 57 Turnstone, 4 Whinchats, 5 Fieldfares, 9 Reed Warblers, 3 Whitethroats, 35 Garden Warblers, 26 Willow Warblers and 9 Pied Flycatchers.






13th August: The Pectoral Sandpiper remains on Easter Lother Water. A Water Rail was new for the autumn as were two Red-backed Shrikes. Census counts included 3 Icterine Warblers, 28 Lapwings, Greenshank, Cuckoo, Redstart, 3 Whinchat, 2 Grasshopper Warblers, 4 Reed Warblers, 2 Whitethroats, 15 Garden Warblers, 2 Wood Warblers, 18 Willow Warblers, Spotted Flycatcher and 15 Pied Flycatchers.

12th August: The Pectoral Sandpiper was still present on Easter Lother in the company of a Ruff (with three other Ruff at Setter). The Cuckoo and a ringed Icterine Warbler were seen again and a Wryneck was flushed near the ringing hut. A Short-eared Owl frequented the Rippack whilst waders included 2 Greenshank and singles of Common and Green Sandpiper. The flock of Grey Herons at South Light was reduced to nine. Most small passerines were in lesser numbers with counts of 16 Garden Warbler, 20 Willow Warbler and 7 Pied Flycatcher but the disappointment was dispelled with the discovery of an AQUATIC WARBLER at Hegri Burn only the second record in the past ten years (following one in 1997) and the 35th island record.

11th August: Another good days birding with a fresh north-easterly wind keeping the heat at a comfortable temperature - until the fog rolled in late afternoon! Birds were similar to yesterday with 3 Wrynecks and 2 Barred Warblers leading the way, joined by a good number of common migrants; 4 Ruff, Cuckoo, 4 Fieldfare, 6 Reed Warbler, 43 Garden Warbler, 7 Whitethroat, 3 Lesser Whitethroat, 36 Willow Warbler, 2 Wood Warbler, 22 Pied Flycatcher and a single Spotted Flycatcher.

10th August: An excellent day's birding today, with a moderate easterly wind and warm, sunny skies. Birds of the day were a Pectoral Sandpiper on Easter Lother, 2 Wrynecks (earliest autumn records - one trapped, one at Midway), 2 Icterine Warblers (one trapped, one at Gunnawark) and a Barred Warbler. Census counts produced 3 Teal, 13 Grey Herons, 18 Golden Plovers, 2 Knot, 9 Sanderling, 19 Dunlin, 6 Ruff, 4 Common Sandpiper, 2 Sandwich Terns, a Cuckoo, 4 Sand Martins, 2 Redstarts, 2 Whinchat, the Fieldfare, 2 Grasshopper Warblers (earliest autumn records), 9 Reed Warblers, 2 Whitethroats, 26 Garden Warblers, 6 Wood Warblers, 32 Willow Warblers and 28 Pied Flycatchers!

9th August: More sunshine and more migrants. Firsts for the autumn included 2 Greenshank, 6 Sand Martins, Fieldfare, Reed Warbler, 2 Garden Warblers and Pied Flycatcher. Other notable sightings included 3 Teal, 13 Grey Herons, 10 Golden Plovers, 2 Ruff, Wood Sandpiper, Common Sandpiper, 580 Common Gulls, 2 Sedge Warblers, 2 Garden Warblers and 5 Willow Warblers.

8th August: A sunny day with a SE wind produced a sprinkle of migrants that included 3 Grey Herons, 4 Golden Plovers, 3 Knot, 8 Sanderling, a Ruff, Short-eared Owl, Whinchat, 5 Sedge Warblers, a Whitethroat and 4 Willow Warblers. The Canada Geese remain!

7th August: Another extremely foggy day meant that counts were extremely low. Sightings of note included a Teal, 35 Turnstone, 3 Sedge Warblers, a Barred Warbler and a Willow Warbler.

6th August: The thick fog returns, but a Common Rosefinch trapped in the Gully and 2 Barred Warblers (South Raeva and Meadow Burn) provided interest. Another day of wader counts with 13 Golden Plovers, 8 Sanderling, 28 Purple Sandpipers, the Ruff, 38 Redshank, Green Sandpiper, Common Sandpiper and 72 Turnstone. Other sightings included 12 Swallows, 4 Sedge Warblers, 4 Chiffchaffs and a Willow Warbler.

5th August: A day of 'proper' census in glorious sun-shine! A Ruff at Midway was an addition to the year-list and autumn warblers included 7 Sedge Warblers, a Whitethroat, 5 Chiffchaffs and 2 Willow Warblers. Otherwise, a Cormorant, 20 Lapwing, 5 Sanderling, 13 Purple Sandpipers, 87 Redshank and 150 Wheatears were counted. The Reed Bunting was re-found at Setter.

1st – 4th August: Autumn migration is now underway and daily census is now underway following the seabird monitoring of July. However, fog is hampering efforts and the only birds of note are non-passerines that have struggled through! Waders are very much on the move and peak counts include 3 Green Sandpipers (1st), 6 Dunlin and 39 Redshank (3rd), 14 Sanderling and 12 Golden Plover (4th). A Wood Sandpiper was on Golden Water on the 3rd. Gulls are also moving with 64 Common Gulls and 6 Black-headed Gulls on the 3rd and an unusual sighting of a Glaucous Gull on the 4th.

The two Canada Geese remain and Storm Petrel ringing sessions (2) resulted in another 18 birds trapped.

22nd - 31st July: Not much to report in this period, although a first-summer Rosy Starling near the school on the 30th finished the month quite nicely! A **Marsh Harrier** in Gilsetter on the 22nd was a welcome addition to the year-list and was extremely unusual at this time of year. A Wood Sandpiper (another year-tick was more expected and remained until the 27th). The 23rd was a good day as Fair Isle's third summer record of **Hobby** (a first-summer bird) was found on the Rippack. Counts of birds included 231 Oystercatcher, 3 Golden Plover, 6 Sanderling, 6 Dunlin, 21 Redshank, 4 Green Sandpiper, Common Sandpiper, 11 Turnstone, 23 Black-headed Gull and 133 Common Gulls. A Sedge Warbler was trapped on the 26th and the next day saw a **Short-eared Owl**. 4 **Chiffchaffs** and 7 **Swift**.

Storm Petrel sessions during the period resulted in approximately 25 birds trapped – very poor.

<u>16th - 21st July:</u> A census on the 19th produced counts of 24 Lapwing, 2 Sanderling, 14 Purple Sandpipers, 2 Whimbrel, 56 Redshank, 38 Turnstone, 70 Black-headed Gulls, 50 Common Gulls, 19 Lesser Black-backed Gulls and 25 Swift. Otherwise, a Long-eared Owl remained in Field Ditch (18th-19th) and a Short-eared Owl was at Field (18th). The Blackbird, 2 Chiffchaffs, 2 Canada Geese (all from May/June) and the Reed Bunting all remain.

11th – 15th July: Another quiet period! The 14th was the best day with a Quail near Ward Hill (the same place as a month ago hinting at a possible breeding attempt) and a Long-eared Owl on Bully's Pallets in Field Ditch. Three Chiffchaffs remain in the Observatory garden. The Canada Geese are still disappearing and re-appearing. The odd Common Swift has been seen. A Common Redpoll (probably a Mealy) was in the Obs garden on 15th and a very un-seasonal Reed Bunting was trapped in the Plantation. A **Storm Petrel** ringing session on the night of 15th/16th produced 15 birds in an hours trapping.

4th - 10th July: The highlights of this period were a Common Rosefinch and Long-tailed Duck (4th), Long-eared Owl, Reed Warbler and Redpoll (probably of one of the Greenland/Icelandic races) on the 7th. Daily Red-throated Divers have been seen flying north and the occasional Swift has been seen. South-bound waders are now more evident with small flocks of Redshank, Turnstone, Dunlin and Curlew seen. Small parties of Crossbills (max 5 birds) have been seen on the cliffs.


<u>1st - 3rd July:</u> The 1st produced a **Red-throated Diver, Sanderling, Swift** and **Spotted Flycatcher**. Three **Golden Plovers** were at Barkland (3rd), another **Long-eared Owl** was found on Buness (June's bird still remains) and a **Common Rosefinch** was at the Obs. The **Canada Geese** are still in the south of the island.

<u>30th June:</u> A **Red-throated Diver** flew north, a **Sanderling** was in Muckle Uri Geo, a **Swift** flew north over the Obs and 2 **Chiffchaffs** remain in the Obs garden.

<u>27th – 29th June:</u> Not much to report with most sightings from the 29th, with a **Red-throated Diver, Manx Shearwater** and **Storm Petrel** from the Good Shepherd and on land, 2 **Grey Herons**, a **Blackcap**, **Red-backed Shrike** and **Mealy Redpoll**. Three **Swifts** were seen on the 28th, the last day that the **Icterine Warbler** was at Barkland and a new **Red-backed Shrike** was trapped.

25th-26th June: Not much to report from the 25th, although a Short-eared Owl flew north in the evening, but a small arrival of scarce migrants on the 26th (in a moderate SE wind) included an Icterine Warbler and Common Rosefinch at Barkland, 2 Red-backed Shrikes at the Chalet and a Quail near Ward Hill. Other note-worthy migrants included a Blackcap, 2 Whitethroats, a handful of Chiffchaffs and a Willow Warbler.



<u>24th June:</u> With a strong northerly wind and rain, expectation wasn't high, but seabirds took the back seat today (due to weather) and the day started well with a **Honey Buzzard** loafing around the island. A female **Red-backed Shrike** was trapped in the Plantation. Otherwise it was quiet with a couple of **Whitethroats**, a **Garden Warbler** and the **Long-eared Owl** making other note-worthy sightings.

<u>19th – 23rd June:</u> Much the same bird-wise and as 'Seabird season' begins, census takes a back seat. The highlight was a late report of an adult Long-tailed Skua (18th). Small numbers of non-breeding waders are passing through, including Dunlin and Whimbrel. Single Whitethroat, Lesser Whitethroat, Garden Warbler, Blackcap and Willow Warbler were seen. Three Chiffchaffs remain at the Observatory and two Spotted Flycatchers were in the Plantation (22nd). A juvenile Siskin was at the Obs (20th – 23rd). The two Canada Geese and the Long-eared Owl remain.

<u>16th -18th June:</u> Two **Storm Petrels** were seen from the Good Shepherd (16th), the **Long-eared Owl** remains and a **Short-eared Owl** was seen on the 18th. A female **Blackbird** was trapped and a male **Red-backed Shrike** was seen on the 16th, with a new **Marsh Warbler** and **Pied Flycatcher** (17th) and a female **Blackcap** and **Chiffchaff** on the 18th. A **Garden Warbler**, 5 **Chiffchaffs** and a **Willow Warbler** were seen on the 17th. The two **Canada Geese** re-appeared in the south of the island (17th).

15th June: Extremely strong westerly winds made census very difficult again, but a Quail at the Chalet was a welcome year-tick. Otherwise, 9 Dunlin, a Whimbrel, the Long-eared Owl and the Observatory Marsh Warbler were noteworthy.

14th June: Low cloud and mist hampered census, but a Pink-footed Goose at Utra was an odd June sight. Counts included a Dunlin, 12 Collared Doves, the Long-eared Owl, 4 House Martins, 2 Swallows, 2 Marsh Warblers and a Whitethroat



13th June: More encouragement today with new arrivals including a female Redbacked Shrike trapped on the early morning round and 2 Marsh Warblers (Chalet and Obs). Otherwise quiet with just the 4 Tufted Ducks and Long-eared Owl of note.

12th June: Another quality spring arrival in the form of two Canada Geese in South Harbour late in the day. A quiet census produced 4 Tufted Ducks, 4 Golden Plover, 7 Black-headed Gulls, 15 Collared Doves, Long-eared Owl, House Martin, female Blackcap, 7 Chiffchaffs, a Spotted Flycatcher and the Siskin.

An adult Hobby was in Homisdale, a Reed Warbler was in the Obs plantation (with a Marsh Warbler!) and 2 female Black Redstarts were seen. 8th June: Today's highlight were 2 Red-necked Phalaropes seen on the Good Shepherd crossing – only the 16th FI record and the first since 2000. An easterly blow produced an Icterine Warbler, another Bluethroat and 8 Red-backed Shrikes. Otherwise, a male Tufted Duck, Wood Pigeon, 10 Collared Doves, 3 Long-eared Owls, Dunnock, Robin, Redwing and Linnet were seen. The Rosy Starling is still at the Mast.

7th June: An excellent morning's census produced a Hobby on Vaasetter, Common Buzzard in Wirvie, a male Bluethroat singing at the Obs and a Redbreasted Flycatcher trapped in the Vaadal. Other migrants included a male Tufted Duck, female Goldeneye, Kestrel, the Cuckoo, 3 Long-eared Owls, Whinchat, Red-backed Shrike, 2 Common Rosefinches and the Rosy Starling. A few Phylloscopus and Sylvia Warblers were also seen.

6th June: Better conditions today and new birds included a Black-tailed Godwit, 2 Long-eared Owls (1 new) and another singing Common Rosefinch. Counts included 3 Tufted Ducks, female Merlin, 3 Sanderling, 4 Swift, the Cuckoo, 11

Swallows, 12 House Martins, the Marsh Warbler, Whitethroat, 3 Chiffchaffs, Willow Warbler, 2 Red-backed Shrikes and the Rosy Starling.

5th June: Not much to report today in almost impossible conditions. The Rustic Bunting has re-located to South Haven beach and the Obs garden and was even heard singing! Three Red-backed Shrikes have been seen, a Marsh Warbler was re-trapped and the Common Rosefinch is still in the Obs garden. The Long-eared Owl is still at Midway and the Cuckoo is still in the Raevas. A Dunnock was in the Obs garden.

4th June: A smart male Rustic Bunting was found at lunch-time on the beach of South Harbour. It showed well and even burst into song at times! Other arrivals included a Cuckoo, female Goldeneye, male Kestrel, Short-eared Owl, Whinchat and Yellowhammer. Counts included 3 Tufted Ducks, 3 Sanderling, 8 Collared Doves, yesterday's Long-eared Owl, 12 House Martins, 2 Marsh Warblers, yesterday's Icterine Warbler, 2 Red-backed Shrikes, Rosy Starling and 2 Common Rosefinches.

<u>3rd June:</u> An extremely miserable day today, with soaking wet weather hampering all birding efforts. However, through foggy binoculars we managed to find a new Icterine Warbler, a Long-eared Owl, Marsh Warbler, 2 Common Rosefinches, 4 Tufted Ducks, female Merlin, 11 Collared Doves and a sprinkling of warblers. The Rosy Starling remains faithful to the mast area at Ward Hill.

2nd June: Today's highlight was a Golden Oriole at Wirvie. It was seen briefly in the morning and then re-found feeding on Mopul during the evening. Other scarce migrants included 2 Marsh Warblers, the ringed Icterine Warbler, 10 Red-backed Shrikes and 2 Common Rosefinches (including one of May's ringed birds). Counts of commoner migrants included 6 Dunlin, 2 Wood Pigeons, 5 Collared Doves, 5 Swift, 41 Swallows, Robin, the Nightingale, 2 Sedge Warblers, 8 Lesser Whitethroats, 4 Whitethroats, 5 Garden Warblers, 5 Blackcaps, 4 Chiffchaffs, 4 Willow Warblers and 5 Spotted Flycatchers. The Rosy Starling is still at the Mast.

1st June: Another day of scarce migrants, mostly birds which remained from May. These included 8 Red-backed Shrikes, the Rosy Starling and a Common Rosefinch. New scarce migrants included a female Bluethroat, 5 Marsh Warblers and 2 Icterine Warblers (1 from May). Census included 16 Dunlin, Sand Martin, 22 Swallows, 9 House Martins, 16 House Martins, Whinchat, 4 Sedge Warblers, 7 Lesser Whitethroats, 4 Whitethroats, 3 Garden Warblers, 3 Blackcaps, 5 Chiffchaffs, 3 Willow Warblers and a Spotted Flycatcher.

31st May: Yet another excellent day. The highlight was a Red-throated Pipit at Furse which showed well to its admiring crowd. Scarce migrants included 3 Marsh Warblers (2 new birds), yesterday's Icterine Warbler, a male Bluethroat, at least 9 Red-backed Shrikes (4 trapped), 3 Common Rosefinches and the Rosy Starling. Common migrants included 2 Teal, Tufted Duck, Knot (year-tick), Sanderling, 36 Swallows, 14 House Martins, Nightingale, 4 Sedge Warblers, 7 Lesser Whitethroats, 5 Whitethroats, 3 Garden Warblers, 3 Blackcaps, 4 Chiffchaffs and 5 Spotted Flycatchers.



30th May: The fog cleared to leave another day of overcast conditions and a SE wind. An Icterine Warbler (year-tick) was found at the Chalet before lunch and 2 Marsh Warblers were also year-ticks. Other scarce migrants included another female Bluethroat and 3 Red-backed Shrikes. Census counts included Teal, 2 Merlin, Swift, 42 Swallows, 5 House Martins, 6 Sedge Warblers, 5 Whitethroats, Blackcap, 2 Chiffchaffs and 5 Spotted Flycatchers.

29th May: The down side to a day of SE winds on Fair Isle during the spring is that it is closely followed by fog! Today was that day an census was made difficult as a result. However, a new female Bluethroat was found along with 2 Red-backed Shrikes and a male Hen Harrier floated north. Other notable counts included 2 Teal, 14 Swallows, 2 Tree Pipits, Robin, 6 Sedge Warblers and 3 Chiffchaffs. The Rosy Starling is still at the mast.

28th May: Another good day. The highlight was a Golden Oriole on Meoness that unfortunately disappeared before island-listers could get there! Ward Hill was site of the day with the Rosy Starling, a Dotterel and a Lapland Bunting. Census produced 2 Sparrowhawks, Merlin, Black-tailed Godwit, Sand Martin, 16 Swallows, 23 House Martins, Grey Wagtail, female Bluethroat, female Redstart, Whinchat, Grasshopper Warbler, 3 Sedge Warblers, 3 Lesser Whitethroats, Garden Warbler, 6 Chiffchaffs, 3 Spotted Flycatcher, male Pied Flycatcher and 2 Mealy Redpolls.

27th May: The wind finally switched to the south-east this morning (the first time since the 6th May!), with almost instant results. A Rosy Starling flew past the Obs after breakfast, a red male Common Rosefinch was at the Obs at lunch-time and an Osprey flew north over the Obs at 22:00! Elsewhere on the island, counts included 2 Red-breasted Mergansers, 2 Sanderling, 2 Wood Pigeon, 30 Swallows, 20 House Martins, 2 Grey Wagtails, the Nightingale, 2 Whinchats, female Ring Ouzel, Song Thrush, 3 Sedge Warblers, Reed Warbler (year-tick), 4 Whitethroats, male Blackcap, Spotted Flycatcher and Siskin. The Good Shepherd crossing produced 2 Storm Petrels and a Pomarine Skua.

<u>26th May:</u> A better day today with some visible migration. *Hirundines* were moving through with a **Sand Martin**, 17 **Swallows** and 3 **House Martins**. Census produced a **Common Sandpiper**, 2 **Tree Pipits**, **Yellow Wagtail**, the **Nightingale**, 100 **Wheatears**, 3 **Redwings**, **Sedge Warbler**, female **Blackcap**, 4 **Willow Warblers**, **Spotted Flycatcher**, the female **Pied Flycatcher**, 3 **Tree Sparrows** and a different **Crossbill**.

<u>25th May:</u> Another quiet day with new arrivals including a Barnacle Goose, a female Pied Flycatcher and Crossbill. Otherwise, the Iceland Gull, Tree Pipit, 2 Yellow Wagtails, Sedge Warbler and 4 Tree Sparrows were noteworthy.

<u>24th May:</u> The **Subalpine Warbler** was still present today, but doing a grand tour of the south of the island! Otherwise, a pleasant sunny day with birds including 12 **Whimbrel**, 2 **Tree Pipits**, 2 **Yellow Wagtails**, **Sedge Warbler**, 4 **Chiffchaffs**, 3 **Willow Warblers** and **Brambling**. The **Nightingale**, 4 **Tree Sparrows**, **Goldfinch** and **Iceland Gull** all remain.

23rd May: Despite there being no change in the weather, an arrival of scarce migrants included a male Subalpine Warbler (of the eastern race *albistriata*), a Wryneck, female Bluethroat, a Turtle Dove (yeartick) and the re-appearance of the Nightingale at Leogh (apparently it has been living in the chicken shed at Midway!). Counts included 2 Teal, 21 Swallows, Redwing, 2 Whitethroats, 3 Chiffchaffs, 4 Willow Warblers, Spotted Flycatcher, Mealy Redpoll and 2 Snow Buntings.

<u>22nd May:</u> Very quiet. No sign of the **Dotterel** again, but census counts included 2 **Wigeon**, a **Sanderling**, **Shorteared Owl**, 2 **Swifts**, 14 **Swallows**, 2 **Blackcaps** and a Chiffchaff.

<u>21st May:</u> Today's highlight was a **Dotterel** seen by the only non-birdwatchers staying at the Observatory! It was seen on Hoini and described perfectly – viewable down to 3ft! Otherwise, a **Merlin** and 6 **Tree Sparrows** were new. The **Brambling**, **Black-tailed Godwits**, **Goldfinch**, **Iceland Gull** and **Crossbill** all seem reluctant to leave!

<u>20th May:</u> Much the same. Remaining birds included the 2 Black-tailed Godwits, Goldfinch, Iceland Gull and Short-eared Owl. 'New' birds were represented by 20 Whimbrel, 21 Swallows, a female Blackcap, a male Brambling, a Chaffinch and 3 Linnets. Appropriate to the weather, a Snow Bunting was on Ward Hill.

19th May: Another very quiet morning meant that some attention switched to the sea – it was equally as quiet there with just a 'blue' Fulmar the highlight. Land sightings picked up in the afternoon and included a Sparrowhawk, Common Sandpiper, Short-eared Owl, 2 Redwing, Lesser Whitethroat, 2 Whitethroats, a Greenfinch, Siskin and a female Crossbill.

18th May: A wet and windy day as a strong south-westerly and rain hampered birding but the **Nightingale** was relocated at Lower Stoneybrek and a **Sandwich Tern** flew past North and South Lights. The two **Black-tailed** Godwits, two **Ring Ouzels**, two **Tree Sparrows**, the **Iceland Gull** and **Goldfinch** all remain.

17th May: A much better day today, despite the increasing SW wind. An Osprey circled Buness during lunch-time before drifting north and a Nightingale was typically elusive at Leogh. Two Black-tailed Godwits were at Setter and on the sea, a Long-tailed Skua flew past Buness. Other migrants included a Peregrine, 6 Wood Pigeons, 10 Collared Doves, Swift, 17 Swallows, 5 House Martins, 5 Tree Pipits, 2 Ring Ouzels, Sedge Warbler, Garden Warbler, 3 Willow Warblers, Chaffinch and a Snow Bunting. The Pintail and Hawfinch were both re-located and the 2 Tree Sparrows, Goldfinch and Iceland Gull remain.

<u>16th May:</u> Another quiet morning meant attention switched to the sea in the afternoon where a **Manx Shearwater** flew south. On land during the afternoon things picked up as a band of rain moved through with notable migrants moving ahead of the rain including 24 **Black-headed Gulls**, **Cuckoo**, 11 **Swift**, 100 **Swallows** and 5 **House Martins**. Other sightings included 4 **Tree Pipits**, 4 **Whitethroats**, **Blackcap**, **Spotted Flycatcher** and 2 Mealy Redpoll. Just 2 **Tree Sparrows** remain!

15th May: Today's highlights were a female Crossbill and Swift (year-tick) in the north of the island. Otherwise, it was another quiet day with just a Redthroated Diver and counts of 22 Whimbrel, 40 Lesser Black-backed Gulls, 4 Common Terns, 140 Arctic Terns, 6 Swallows and 3 House Martins. Four Tree Sparrows remain at the Observatory along with the Goldfinch and Iceland Gull.

14th May: Again a fairly quiet day. The Pintail re-appeared in the south and a Short-eared Owl was at the Airstrip. Census produced a Red-throated Diver, 11 Whimbrel, 2 Common Sandpipers, 15 Collared Doves, 9 Swallows, Bluethroat, Sedge Warbler, 8 Tree Sparrows and a Chaffinch. The Goldfinch, Hawfinch and Iceland Gull are all still here!

13th May: Today's highlight was a summer-plumaged male Snow Bunting at the Peat Cuttings. Otherwise, much quieter with counts including a Grey Heron, Sparrowhawk, 19 Whimbrel, 12 Collared Doves, 9 Swallows, one Bluethroat, 3 Lesser Whitethroats, Wood Warbler, 4 Chiffchaffs, 12 Tree Sparrows and 3 Chaffinches.

12th May: A glorious day and another raptor heading north - this time a Rough-legged Buzzard. Another highlight was a probable Red-rumped Swallow seen extremely briefly by two observers at the Observatory. Census counts included 2 Teal, 2 Goosander, Grey Heron, 3 Sparrowhawks, Kestrel, 21 Whimbrel, 4 Common Sandpipers, 6 Wood Pigeons, 3 Sand Martins, 30 Swallows, House Martin, Grey-headed Wagtail, 6 Whitethroats and a Chaffinch. Two Bluethroats, 2 Red-backed Shrikes and 12 Tree Sparrows were the scarce migrants.

11th May: The Collared Flycatcher is still in Sma' Trinket Geo. An Osprey flew north over the isle at 21:00 and headed out to sea. Two Black Redstarts, 3 Red-backed Shrikes, a Bluethroat and Wood Warbler were all seen, but it was an even quieter day for common migrants. On the sea, a Sooty Shearwater and Pomarine Skua were reported from the Good Shepherd. Back on land, a Red-throated Diver flew north and counts included 12 Tree Pipits, 4 Redstarts, Ring Ouzel, a Grasshopper Warbler, 5 Blackcaps, Goldcrest, 15 Spotted Flycatchers, 2 Pied Flycatchers, 12 Tree Sparrows, 8 Siskin and 5 Reed Buntings.

10th May: A very foggy start to the day meant that the census was conducted in the afternoon. The Collared Flycatcher was not seen in the morning but re-appeared when the fog had lifted in the afternoon. Otherwise it was a quieter day for common migrants. Four Bluethroats, 5 Red-backed Spotted Flycatcher Shrikes, a Corncrake, 2 Grey-headed Wagtails and 2 Wood Warblers were the highlights.  9^{th} May: After much working of the island looking for migrants, the work finally paid off today as a first-summer male Collared Flycatcher was found in Sma' Trinket Geo. It is the third F.I. record, the last being an adult male in May 1998. Supporting cast included a Bluethroat, 7 Red-backed Shrikes, 12 Tree Sparrows and a new Hawfinch joining the other bird. Census counts included 70 Barnacle Geese (year-tick), 4 Teal, 3 Grey Herons, 8 Tree Pipits, female Yellow Wagtail, 4 Grasshopper Warblers, 14 Lesser Whitethroats, 2 Wood Warblers (year-tick), 25 **Spotted Flycatchers** and 5 female **Pied Flycatchers**.

8th May: The good weather continues. The morning census produced very little, but a wander in the afternoon revealed birds were starting to arrive. Another walk after dinner produced more birds which included 3 Wrynecks, 5 Bluethroats, 17 Spotted Flycatchers (year-tick) and 7 Red-backed Shrikes. Other counts included 3 Common Sandpipers, 2 Common Terns, 28 Arctic Terns, a Cuckoo (year-tick), Short-eared Owl, 21 Tree Pipits, 5 Whinchats, 11 Blackbirds, 10 Sedge Warblers, 11 Lesser Whitethroats, 10 Whitethroats, 2 Pied Flycatchers and 2 Tree Sparrows.

Census produced 4 Red-breasted Mergansers, Sparrowhawk, 2 Common Sandpipers, 10 Black-headed Gulls, 78 Common Gulls, 23 Lesser Black-backed Gulls, 25 Arctic Terns, 4 Sand Martins, 40 Swallows, 4 House Martins, 21 Tree Pipits, female Yellow Wagtail, Black Redstart, 11 Blackcaps, male Pied Flycatcher, 13 Bramblings, 4 Greenfinches, 8 Mealy Redpolls, 2 Yellowhammers and 9 Reed Buntings.

20th – 30th April: A good spell of birds in the last week of the month, including some small 'falls' ensured that spring arrived in the northern isles. Highlights of this period were an early Short-toed Lark at Naaversgill (23rd-25th), a Goldfinch (24th-month's end), Hawfinch (25th-28th), Corncrake (25th), Common Crane (28th) and 2 Wrynecks on the 30th. Tree Pipit and Grasshopper Warbler were new in on the 21st, a Common Redstart was at Furse on the 23rd, followed by another year-tick the next day with a Common Sandpiper. The 25th was a better day when House Martin was added to the year-list, associating with 11 Swallows and a Sand Martin. A Mistle Thrush was a late sighting at Guidicum. An Arctic Tern and a Sanderling visited the isle briefly on the 26th, but census was hampered by thick fog. Three Pintail in the south was a good spring count on 27th, as slight increases saw 3 Common Sandpipers, 15 Arctic Skuas, 2 Ring Ouzels and 2 Arctic Terns. Three year-ticks on the 29th included Green Sandpiper, Sedge Warbler and Crossbill. A 'littoralis' Rock Pipit was also seen. The 30th was the best day of the spring so far with counts of 11 Whimbrel, 9 Tree Pipits, 9 Robins, 13 Redstarts, 122 Wheatears, 55 Fieldfare, 4 Grasshopper Warblers, 8 Blackcaps, 8 Chiffchaffs and 26 Willow Warblers. Year-ticks were provided by 5 Whinchats, 3 Whitethroats and 2 Pied Flycatchers.

April 19th: A force 8-9 SE wind hampered bird finding & viewing somewhat but the **Pintail** was seen again and a **Stonechat** was at North Light. The **Iceland Gull** still remains outside the Observatory.

April 18th: A splendid day with four additions to the yearlist; Pintail, Whimbrel, Stock Dove and Sand Martin. A fantastic Long-eared Owl sat in full view outside the Observatory in the morning, whilst the Short-eared Owl was also seen again. A Peregrine scared the increased number of migrants, which included Wood Pigeon (6), Collared Dove (4), Meadow Pipit (200), Wheatear (59 - several Greenland), slightly more thrushes, including Ring Ouzel (2) and finches. Also a Willow Warbler and Blackcap (3).

April 17th: A **Short-eared Owl** in Gilsetter was a good start to the morning census, but that was as good as it got! Best sighting was probably 80+ **Guillemots** at Lericum (but none anywhere else) - the first for several weeks!! With **Kittiwakes** already departing, this looks like it is going to be the worst year on record for the seabirds. Very, very depressing!!! A male **Tufted Duck** graced Golden Water and two **Goldeneye** were seen in several places. Other counts included 12 **Purple Sandpipers**, 23 **Common Gull**, 12 **Pied wagtail** and 53 **Wheatear** (including the first Greenland race birds).

April 16th: A bright sunny day and southerly to south-westerly winds induced our first Swallow of the year

to arrive - the 100th species of the year! Three **Lapland Buntings** were also added to the year list before lunch and a **Woodcock** was flushed at Barkland. A small passage of corvids included a **Rook** and there was a smattering of thrushes and finches also. The final trap round of the day produced another year tick - a **Willow Warbler**.

April 15th: Strong south-easterly winds did not bring the hoped for fall of migrants but **Arctic Skuas** increased to two (one of each morph) and a female **Sparrowhawk** was trapped in the Gully. The overwintering **Iceland Gull** has remained throughout.

April 14th: A foggy day but the first **Arctic Skua** (dark morph) was spotted near the airstrip and a male **Blackcap** was in Busta Geo.

April 13th: Three **Wigeon** were the highlight and five **Snow Buntings** were the only other thing (vaguely) of note.

April 12th: A White-tailed Eagle flew south at 1230hrs but was only seen by one lucky person and every gull and Fulmar on Fair Isle. Other sightings included 4 Teal, 56 Curlew (including an impressive flock of 42), 13 Wood Pigeon, 14 Dunnock, 5 Chiffchaff, 7 Goldcrest and 5 Brambling.

April 11th: A fine blue and orange male Merlin graced the hill whilst a Collared Dove toured the south along with 6 Wood Pigeon, 95 Skylark, 2 Black Redstart, 15 Redwing (including one bird singing) and 6 Reed Bunting.



April 10th: A few counts of note; Goldeneye(2), Common Snipe(47), Common Gull(36), Wood Pigeon (3), Black Redstart, Chiffchaff and Snow Bunting(14). Best of all was the male Goosander which flew over the Obs – the first of the year.

April 9th: A **Water Rail** was the first since the wintering birds departed in early March.

April 8th: A male Peregrine was the highlight but 31 Bonxies, 13 Purple Sandpipers and a Wood Pigeon were also noted.

April 7th: A Teal was the first since early January and the Blackcap was seen again. Two Kestrels and a Sparrowhawk annoyed the 153 Oystercatchers, 19 Ringed Plovers, 149 Turnstones, 12 Chaffinch and 6 Reed Buntings.

April 6th: The overwintering Greylag flock decreased from 45 to 23 whilst Bonxies increased to eleven and Blackcap and Moorhen were new for the year. Other sightings of note were; male Tufted Duck, Jack Snipe, Grey Wagtail(2), Robin(28), Goldcrest(15) and Raven(15).

April 5th: Things quietened down again today but **two Black Redstarts**, **Fieldfare (70)**, **Tree Sparrow and Reed Bunting (6)** were seen.



April 4th: A very good day with lots of birds around. Ring Ouzel, Hawfinch and Yellowhammer were the highlights – and all additions to the year list, but other counts included; Grey Heron, Turnstone (101), Bonxie (5), Wood pigeon (5), Meadow Pipit (146), Pied Wagtail (23), White Wagtail,

Dunnock (14), Robin (39), Black redstart (2), Stonechat(4), Wheatear(19), Blackbird(68), Fieldfare (200), Song Thrush(23), Redwing(25), Chiffchaff(10), Goldcrest(55), Jackdaw(3), Raven(7 migrants), Chaffinch(27), Brambling(4), Greenfinch(2), Siskin(3), Linnet(6), Twite(40), Redpoll(3) and Snow

April 3rd: A female Tufted Duck was the only sighting of note.



April 2nd: The female **Sparrowhawk** was seen again as were two Stonechats but a Greenfinch was new and Siskins rose to two.

April 1st: Strong south-easterlies today produced a few more year ticks; Lesser Black-backed Gull in the Havens, Grey wagtail at Wirvie, Chiffchaff (4) and Brambling. A few more Wheatears (16) were noted, 27 Common Gull, one Bonxie, nine Golden Plover, six Pied Wagtail, four Stonechat, five Fieldfare, and a Siskin.. A Woodcock was flushed from the hill and the Sparrowhawk was trapped whilst the Iceland Gull remained in the Havens. The year list has reached 90.

March: The overwintering **Iceland Gull** remained all month and others were seen on 2nd and 15th. **Stonechats** from 15th peaked at five (21st). **Tree Sparrows** (18th & 27th) were good March records.

Nice calm weather induced the first few auks back onto ledges on 2nd when the first Curlews were noted displaying and the first Skylarks singing. Migration picked up from 4th when 50 Oystercatchers, 27 Ringed Plover and 50 Skylark were counted. The wind veered to a more northerly or westerly direction from 5th – 29th but Oystercatchers, Lapwings, Ringed Plovers and Skylarks trickled through with Tufted Duck (6th), Rook (9th), Stonechat & Collared Dove (15th), Mistle Thrush & Reed Bunting (17th), Goldcrest, Jackdaw & Tree Sparrow (18th), Puffin (21st) all additions to the year list. Peak counts of 125 Lapwing and 35 Ringed Plover (9th), 75 Oystercatchers (17th) and 285 Skylark (25th). South-east winds for the final two days produced Sparrowhawk, Peregrine, Black Redstart and Linnet on 30th and our first Bonxies (3), Wheatears (3), Dunnock and Siskin and 15 Goldcrest and Alan Bull (returning once more to the same territory to see if he can successfully attract a mate!!) on 31st.

March 2nd: Pleasant weather and a wander around the north of the isle produced 34 Oystercatchers and three Ringed Plover with the two long-staying Goldeneye in still in Furse. Just a handful of Gannets and Guillemots were noted on the stacks and cliffs. Occasional Skylarks were noted moving overhead and a Jack Snipe was flushed from Wirvie. The first territorial Curlews were noted at Pund where there was a flock of 19 Lapwing.

February 11th-29th: The remainder of the month was also quiet with the wind predominantly from a northerly direction. The Pied Wagtail remained until 13th and a Long-eared Owl trapped in the Obs Plantation on 15th was an obvious highlight. Good weather on 12th produced peak monthly counts of Ringed Plover (5), Curlew (13), Redshank (70), Turnstone (210), Blackbird (32), Redwing (12), Twite (42) and Snow Bunting (100). Two Goldeneye, the Kestrel, 1-2 Merlins, at least three Water Rails and the 1st Winter Iceland Gull were all seen periodically throughout and the Greylag Goose flock with a sole Pink-footed Goose also remained. Small numbers of Oystercatchers trickled through (peak of 24 on 21st). Jack Snipe were flushed on two dates and a Woodcock on 27th. The female Chaffinch in the Obs garden was joined by a male on 14th and another on 21st and Skylarks began to move at the end of the month with 30 counted on 28th.

1st-10th February: The month started with snow still covering the isle but it had all gone by 4th. Very little of note was seen in the first week although 17 **Lapwing** with a **Golden Plover**, 3 **Ringed Plover** and the first returning **Oystercatchers** (2) were noted on 7th, along with 10 **Curlew** and 40 **Snow Buntings**. More snow overnight meant that we awoke to a white island again on 9th but this did not deter the first **Slavonian Grebe** and **Pied Wagtail** of the year. The latter bird may be the earliest ever record. The overwintering **Common Redpoll** was also seen on 9th. The **Slavonian grebe** was still present on 10th, when **Little Auk** and **Oystercatcher** also frequented the Havens. A **Merlin** was seen and counts of 120 **Turnstone**, 14 **Purple Sandiper**, 7 **Lapwing**, 20 **Redshank**, 55 **Greylag** and one **Pinkfoot** were also made.

14th-31st January: Gannets were noted back on Yellow Head on 16th but not on the large Stacks o' Scroo. The 16th also produced a few Little Auks and Guillemots past South Light, four Teal and two Goldeneye. A good thrash around on 20th saw the goose collection (67 Greylag, 5 European Whitefronts, two Pinkfeet) still present with counts of 87 Turnstone, 47 Snipe, 22 Redshank, 26 Curlew,

5 Purple Sandpiper, 38 Blackbird, 42 Redwing, 6 Song Thrush, two Fieldfare, and highlights of a Grey Heron and a Great Northern Diver. The 22nd saw the (re) appearance of a 1stW Iceland Gull in the Havens. The first Ringed Plover of the year was found on 23rd - an early date and a Dunlin the following day, when two 1stW Glaucous Gulls, Kittiwake, 8 Curlew and a Kestrel were also seen but the Whitefronted geese had departed and the Obs Chaffinches were reduced to one! Snow and strong winds towards the end of the month resulted in a Jack Snipe being forced to show itself and a Little Auk crash landing in the Obs garden whilst the majority of thrushes cleared out!

7th - 13th January: A small number of Redwings and Blackbirds remained throughout with the odd sighting of Song Thrush and Fieldfare. The Brent Goose was last seen on the 7th. A breezy day on the 8th produced 2 Iceland Gulls (a first-winter (remaining until the 10th) and a second-winter), with 10 Little Auks past South Light, along with the year's first Guillemots. The Obs Chaffinch was joined by a second bird on the 9th. An adult Wood Pigeon was outside the Observatory the following day, as a Long-tailed Duck visited the Havens with a pair of Goldeneye and a Little Auk was at Wirvie. Another five Little Auks flew past South Light on the 11th and 60 Snow Buntings were counted. Robins increased to 10 birds on the 12th and the 13th produced 42 Greylag Geese, 2 Pink-footed Geese and the re-appearance of the 5 European White-fronted Geese.

1st - 6th January: The first week of January is often quiet, but a blast of cold winds grounded some wildfowl, with 4 **White-fronted Geese** accompanying 40 **Greylags** on the 2nd (joined by a fifth bird on the 4th and all remaining until the 6th), a **pale-bellied Brent Goose** with 2 **'rossicus' Bean Geese** and a good winter count of 18 **Wigeon** and 7 **Teal**. A **Greenland/Icelandic Redpoll** was trapped in the Gully (2nd), a **Little Auk** was in the Havens on the 3rd and a **Long-tailed Duck** was off South Harbour on the 4th. A male **Chaffinch** was in the Observatory garden on the 6th and a **Golden Plover** was at Barkland, while 3 **Woodcock** were in the Gully. The year list so far stands at 54 species - not bad for a small island in the first week of January!
